On Tuesday, 10 January, Archbishop Malcolm visited St Joseph's Catholic Primary School in Leigh. He was warmly greeted by the Headteacher, Miss Daley and RE Leader Mrs Melling, before spending time talking to the school's prayer group, the 'Mini Vinnies.'

Miss Datey said, Wichtishop Matootm is a friendly and knowledgeable man whose warmth and leindness has created a lovely memory for us all to hold dear. He visit was the perfect start to a new term and indeed the new year – 2023.

They fall this all about the work they completed together with the School Council and Eco-Council in the autumn term to help achieve the Catod Live Singly Award. We had our very own fundraising page. Thank you for helping us to tell poverty to.....jog on!









Switch Off Day


